Warning following cryptocurrency fraud reports across Kent

Kent residents are being warned to be vigilant against cryptocurrency fraud attempts following reports from nine victims.

The victims had a combined loss of over £1 million after their personal information was shared online following a data leak.

Personal details were taken from the data leak and used to generate fake Action Fraud reports.

Once these reports were created the victims were then contacted by someone claiming to be a police officer reassuring them that an investigation had been launched.

The officer then told them to expect a call from the crypto wallet host.

A second call was then received from someone claiming to be a security officer asking the victim for their seed phrase which is a 12 or 24-word phrase which allows users to control a cryptocurrency wallet.

With that information the fraudsters were able to rebuild the wallet, steal the funds and transfer them so that they can't be recovered.

Detective Sergeant Darryll Paulson said: "I urge anyone contacted by someone claiming to be from a crypto host, or

from the police, not to give out any personal details.

"Scammers are becoming increasingly more calculating in their methods to defraud their victims into losing a substantial amount of money and will often create urgency in the situation, such as telling them they need to act now to stop their funds from being stolen.

"Don't be embarrassed about reporting a scam, it only takes a second to be distracted and fall victim."

Further advice:

- If you are not confident a person who calls you claiming to be a security or police officer is genuine, ask to take their details and end the call.
- Wait for at least five minutes for the call to clear and then contact 101, or 999 in an emergency. A call handler will be able to verify whether your caller was genuine.

More Consideration is Needed for Horses on Our Roads

Horses can easily be frightened by passing cars. There have been a number of reports of road rage involving cars trying to pass ridden horses.

Over 3,500 incidents involving horses and vehicles have been reported nationally from 2019 to the end of 2024.

Of the incidents more than 80% were caused by cars passing too close or driving too fast around horses.

Sadly, over 130 horses and 40 riders have lost their lives in road accidents over the past decade.

This is extremely upsetting to hear. The campaign "Pass Wide and Slow" advocates for safer practices on the road, urging drivers to pass horses at a safe distance and speed. The campaign also

encourages horse riders to report any incidents involving dangerous driving to the police. This will also help raise awareness and contribute to the statistics used in improving road safety measures.

Please be more considerate when driving on our roads, by doing so lives can certainly be saved.



Protect yourself from Holiday fraud: don't let fraudsters trip you up this summer

People looking to snap up online holiday deals ahead of the summer are being warned to stay extra alert and do their research before booking their getaways, as new data reveals victims lost a total of over £11 million to holiday fraud last year.

Action Fraud, the national fraud and cybercrime reporting service, has launched a holiday fraud campaign, urging the public who are looking to snap up their next holiday deals online to look out for suspiciously enticing offers online, including on social media, and do their research before booking their getaways.

New data shows there were 6,066 reports of holiday fraud made to Action Fraud last year, with July recorded as the highest month of reporting with 647 reports.

Holiday makers lost a combined total of £11,183,957 in 2024, which is comparatively less than the £12.3 million lost in 2023. Despite, the drop in reported loss, the average loss per victim remains at similar levels, with £1,851 the average in 2023 and £1,844 in 2024.

What can you do to protect yourself from holiday fraud?

Check the travel company is legitimate: About to book a holiday? Do some research first to check that the company is legitimate, especially if you haven't used them before. Use consumer websites, or reviews from people (or organisations) that you trust. *Look for the logos:* Look for the **ABTA**, **ABTOT** or **ATOL** logos on the company's

website. If you're unsure, you can use the links below to verify membership:

Use a credit card to pay: Use a credit card for payments (if you have one). Many of these protect online purchases as part of the **Consumer Credit Act**. *Only provide required details at checkout:* When making your payment, only fill in the mandatory details (often marked with an asterisk) such as your address. Unless you think you'll become a regular customer, *don't* create an account for the store. *Keep your accounts secure:* Create a strong and unique password for your email. If 2-step verification is available, always enable it. *Watch out for suspicious links:* Whether it's in an email or social media post, be wary of promotions for unbelievably good holiday offers. If you receive a suspicious email, report it by forwarding it to: **report@phishing.gov.uk**.

If you've lost money or provided your financial information to someone, notify your bank immediately and report it to Action Fraud at actionfraud.police.uk or by calling 0300 123 2040. In Scotland, call Police Scotland on 101.

Single-use vapes

Single use vapes should be recycled, not be thrown into your general waste bins where they will land up going to landfill or be incinerated. Disposable vapes should be disposed of safely by taking them to recycling facilities or drop-off locations.

Do check with the shop where you bought the vapes and ask if they take back the used ones. You can also ask your local council where they can be disposed off safely.

It was recently reported on television that a dog had smelt a strawberry smelling vape which was lying on the ground, and had promptly swallowed it.

The dog became ill and when checked out by the vet, was found to have a vape in its stomach. The vet had to operate to remove the item. Thankfully in this case the dog survived.

Please be considerate if you use a vape and dispose of it in the correct manner. Thank you.

8. If you have a lawn it may be a good idea to mow it before you go away.
9. It is a good idea not to display your home address on your luggage.
10. Don't publish your absence on the internet. Status updates comments and photos on social media can give away the fact that you are out of your home for an extended period.
